Project Warmth

Project Warmth is a reimbursement program designed to assist children in need with shoes and coats. Cow Creek youth between the ages of newborn through age 16 and who are Tribally enrolled may qualify for assistance. No income guidelines or service area requirements are necessary. Each child may access this program once per year. Up to \$25.00 per coat and \$25.00 per pair of shoes will be reimbursed to the parent or guardian who purchased the items. Please include the name and address of the person who will be reimbursed, circle the item and write the name of the child on the receipt. Submit receipts to the attention of Cindy Delay, Program Assistant. Any questions can be addressed to Cindy at the Tribal offices 541-677-5575 or 800-929-8229.

Tribal Food Program

The Tribal Food Program is open every month on the second Tuesday from 9-12 and the fourth Tuesday from 1-4 p.m. at the Tribal offices in Roseburg. Applicants must be a Cow Creek Tribal member/family to receive assistance. Applications will not be mailed. However, upon arriving you will be able to complete your form and receive your food. This program is qualified by "income self-certification" and Cow Creek Tribal enrollment with no service area requirements. Food will not be delivered. Please contact Cindy Delay at the Tribal office with any questions.

Student Rental Assistance Program

The Student Rental Assistance Program is a relatively new program designed to help college students with rent during the school year. This program will assist Tribal Members who are attending school full time at an accredited college, university, or technical school with a monthly rental stipend. Students can contact the housing department to obtain an application. If you are a continuing student, an application must be resubmitted annually to continue receiving assistance. Funding is limited for this program, therefore applications must be received as soon as possible. Day Care Assistance

Applications continue to be accepted for the Tribal Child Day Care Program. This program serves the area of Klamath, Deschutes, Lane, Jackson, Josephine, Douglas and Coos counties. To qualify, applicants are required to meet income guidelines, must be living in the Tribal service area, attending either school, work or a training program and the child or children must be enrolled with the Cow Creek Tribe. Currently, there is a waiting list. If you have any questions please contact Rhonda at the Tribal office.

Tribal Committees, Commissions and Boards Moving Forward

Gradual progress continues on the formation of various committees, commissions and boards serving the tribe. The Tribal Board of Directors have completed the appointments of many Tribal members to both the Housing and Utility Boards over the past year. The Tribal Health Director has appointed members to the Alcohol and Drug Advisory Committee and is nearing completion of appointments to the Health Advisory Committee.



Some committees yet to be filled are the Education, Child Protection Team, Natural Resources, and History Committees. Scope of work and defined objectives for these committees must be finalized prior to any appointments.

Interested Tribal members must be at least 18 years old, have transportation, and for <u>some</u> committees, may be required to pass a criminal background investigation. Having a background in the area of interest is helpful, but not mandatory.

Recently, the Tribal Board of Directors adopted a revised Tribal Gaming Ordinance and Rules which included an increase in the number of Gaming Commissioners from 3 to 5 members. Therefore, additional appointments to the Tribal Gaming Commission will be required. Tribal members interested in the Gaming Commission positions will be required to meet certain criteria and must complete a Class III gaming license application and, will be subject to the same background investigation as a Man-

agement employee of Seven Feathers Casino Resort. Interested members must be at least 21 years old with no felonies within the last 10 years.

Tribal Gaming Commissioners are not allowed to game at Seven Feathers Casino Resort. However, they may game at other gaming establishments or venues.

Tribal members who are interested in serving on various committees, boards and commissions are encouraged to express their interest by submitting a letter to the Tribal Government Office, Attn; Tribal Administrator, 2371 NE Stephens Street, Roseburg, OR, 97470. Those who have recently submitted interest letters are considered active and will be considered for any upcoming board, committee or commission openings.

Five Western Oregon Tribes Present at State Fair

Tribal veterans, drummers and dancers from the five Western Oregon Tribes met in Salem on the opening day of the Oregon State Fair to provide an educational entertainment program to the public. A Color Guard comprised of Tribal veterans representing The Confederated Tribes of Coos, Lower Umpqua, and Siuslaw, The Coquille Tribe, The Cow Creek Band of Umpqua Tribe of Indians, The Confederated Tribes of Grand Ronde, and The Confederated Tribes of Siletz opened the program along with a performance by Cow Creek's Thundering Water Drum group.



Nick Sixkiller was the master of ceremonies and introduced the Tribal Chairwoman for the Confederated Tribes of Siletz, Dee Pigsley, who gave the welcoming address.

Performances by the Siletz Tribe's Feather Dancers, the Grand Ronde's Canoe Family, a Flutist, and the Thundering Water Drummers entertained fair goers for over two hours on the Spirit Stage. Cow Creek Tribal member, Brittney Malone, also performed a Fancy dance.

Display booths and tables were staffed by each of the five tribes and included information on various components of the tribes such as Tribal government status, economic contributions of tribes, archeological displays and protection information. A children's craft

table was set up as well as displays of canoes from the various tribes.

This event at the State Fair is considered "payback" to the State of Oregon for the free use of the Oregon Pavilion each January for the Gathering of Oregon's First Nations Pow Wow that is sponsored jointly by the Western Oregon Tribes. Everyone who attended had a great time.

The 2011 Gathering of Oregon's First Nations Pow Wow is schedule for January 29, 2011, so mark your calendars.





OHP News

Tribal members with no health care coverage other than CHS <u>must</u> apply for the Oregon Health Plan (OHP), every three months as required by federal regulations and live I the tribal service area.

OHP standard reservation list is now open. Next drawing is on September 20, 2010. Department of Human Services will randomly select 20,000 names from the OHP standard Reservation list.

It is important to maintain your OHP eligibility. It can be very difficult to take care of eligibility paperwork when you are sick, hurt or need medicine.

2011 CHS Applications

Be watching the mail. It is that time again for the **2011 applications to be resubmitted to the Contract Health Office!** Please be sure to fill out one for each member of the family so we can keep your file current. This is a federal regulation that must be done once a year.

Reminders:

- The number one reason for denials is no purchase order numbers
- Call before each appointment 2 to 3 days in advance for purchase orders
- If you receive a statement call their office and be sure that we have been billed- then forward it to CHS DO NOT ASSUME THAT CHS HAS BEEN BILLED
- Know the name of the business when calling for a purchase order not just the doctors name.
- Only use Emergency Rooms for true emergencies or you may have to pay part or the entire bill

The Earth On Turtle's Back (Onondaga)

Before the Earth existed, there was only water. In the Clouds was Skyland, where a sacred Great Tree grew. The Great Tree had branches that pointed to the four cardinal directions (North, South, East, and West).

An ancient chief lived in Skyland. His wife was with child and she had a dream that the Great Tree was uprooted. Dreams were very important to the Ancient Chief. The chief and his men tried to pull the tree loose, but the taproot was very deep.

Finally, the Ancient Chief, using all his energy, managed to loosen the soil from around the tree. It was uprooted and laid upon its side. However, the tree left a large hole in Skyland. The chief's wife looked down the hole and saw something glittering like water. She steadied herself on the branches of the Great Tree. However, the branch snapped and broke and she fell down endlessly.

Two Swans saw this women and flew up to help her so as to cushion her fall. They then realized that the woman was not like them...she did not have webbed feet or waterproof feathers. This creature could not live in the water. All the animals decided that she would die if they did not think of a plan to save her.

After much discussion, they decide that she was made to live on Earth. However, the only Earth was at the bottom of the continuous oceans and streams. The Duck, the Beaver, and the Loon all tried to bring Earth from the bottom to the top of the water. They all failed. Then the Muskrat, decided to try. He took on a determined look and went up and down, until finally he loosened some Earth. However, they knew Earth did not float on water, so Turtle volunteered to carry Earth on his back. Muskrat put Earth on Turtle's back, but her paw marks still remain to this day.

After Earth reached Turtle's back, it began to increase in size until it became what we today call Turtle Island (North America). The Swans flew down carrying Sky Woman to her new home. Sky Woman relaxed and opened her hand (that held those leaves and seeds from the Great Tree). The seeds fell to Earth, germinated and many new trees grew on Turtle Island.

Life on Earth had begun. Today Mother Earth provides us with food, air, water, and shelter. Turtle with the Great Tree on his back is the symbol of the Iroquois Nation. (Caduto, Michael J. and Joseph Bruchac, Keepers of the Earth. Golden, CO.: Fulcrum, Inc., 1989)
