



The celebration was a result of Public Law 97-391, which was passed through Congress and signed by President Ronald Reagan in 1982, bringing to fruition the results of more than a century of efforts by Tribal members to win recognition. Five times in the 1910's,20's and 30's the Tribe had legislation introduced in Congress. On one occasion, in 1932, a bill passed both houses of Congress, but this bill was vetoed by President Hoover

However, Chairman Courtney emphasized that the evening was about the Tribal membership and a celebration of 30 years of change, challenge and growth.

Chuck Jackson, Ellis Buschmann, Sue Shaffer and Dan Courtney were each recognized and honored for their terms as Tribal Chairman of the Tribe. Louella Rondeau-Michaels and Jack "Tooter" Ansures were recognized for their testimony given on multiple occasions in Washington, DC many years ago working toward recognition for the Tribe.

Others recognized for their service to the Tribe were current Tribal Board members, staff members with 10 years or more of service and all Tribal member employees. Tom Rondeau and Tooter Ansures were honored for their work doing cultural site visits and reburials of native remains for the Cultural Resource Department. Berdine Yurgalevicz was also recognized for her volunteerism with the tribal newsletter.

There were exhibits of Tribal artifacts, crafts, memorabilia and a veterans display honoring Tribal veterans who have served our country. A special artist's table was provided to showcase several tribal artists and their work that was gifted throughout the evening.



Fish Release and Education Day by Kelly Crispen Coates

In 1999 the Umpqua Fishermen's Association (UFA), in partnership with the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife (ODFW), began acclimating steelhead smolts at their Canyonville site. The acclimation program was expanded in 2003 to include a site built and run by the Cow Creek Band of the Umpqua Tribe of Indians. The process begins at Rock Creek Hatchery where steelhead fry are born, raised, fed and housed until the following steelhead acclimation season between December and April. When the acclimation season starts, steelhead smolts are brought to the two acclimation sites to stay for approximately three weeks. This year three batches of smolts were released for a total of 110,000 fish.

The grounds and maintenance crew of

Seven Feathers Hotel & Casino Resort monitor the fish in the Seven Feathers tanks every few hours, feed them twice a day, remove and record dead fish, and record water temperature and dissolved oxygen. Once fish are acclimated, ODFW staff, Tribal Natural Resources staff, Umpqua Fishermen's Association volunteers and Seven Feathers Maintenance Crew gather together to release the fish through a series of pipes at the confluence of Canyon creek and the South Umpqua River. At the time of release, an education day is held at the Canyon Creek site. Elementary school students from throughout Douglas County are bussed to the site where they learn hands on about steelhead. There are six different educational stations set up at the acclimation site by UFA, ODFW and the Partnership for Umpqua Rivers. The stations include; a salmonid lifecycle station where students lean about fish growth and biology; a habitat station that teaches students about stream function in relation to fish; a boat safety station where students learn about rules and regulations for boat use; an invasive species station where students learn about invasive species and how to avoid introducing invasive species to the Umpqua Watershed; a smolt station where students help weigh and measure smolts before they are released into the river; and a station that explains how fish ladders work and how fish are transported in a special tank for brood stock collection. The education day is fun for students, teachers and volunteers, and is a great way to educate the community about fisheries of the Umpqua River.

This year ODFW and UFA were very impressed by how well maintained the Seven Feathers site was, and how healthy the fish were. We would like to thank the members of the crew that helped make this year's release a success: Jim Conner, Jacob Lampton, Bobby Dumont, Amos Grizzle, Chris Wilson, Austin Parazoo, Jeff Wacker, and Roy Hendricks. We would also like to thank UFA, particularly Tom Sutton, PUR and ODFW for their hard work.

Arbor Day 2012 by Jay Walters

Fifty people gathered along Jordan Creek on Saturday, April 21st, to celebrate Arbor Day and the planting of seven Oregon white oak trees – one for each of the seven Cow Creek founding families. Tribal Elder and Board Member Robert Van Norman smudged the trees and gave a prayer prior to planting. Robert urged the group to remember all who attended that day, honor those who came before us, and visit the planted oaks as they grow.

The group also heard from Tribal Forester Jay Walters about the ecological benefits provided by white oak. Oak savannah and woodlands provide habitat for more than 200 species of wildlife. Jim Rich followed with a talk on traditional methods of processing oak acorns into flour for use in porridges and breads. Fisheries Biologist Kelly Coates talked about the extensive restoration work the Tribe has undertaken on Jordan Creek. The spawning Coho salmon and winter steelhead are evidence of the significant work done so far.

We plan to focus on a different tree species each year at

our Arbor Day event. Last year was incense cedar, this year Oregon white oak, next year – well, come to the event and find out!

Transformation Café Opens Classes to the Public



Early in 2012, the Cow Creek Health and Wellness Center launched a new program, Transformation Café, targeted at helping people exercise effectively and eat nutritionally. Transformation Café' classes met weekly for 2 1/2 hours for 6 weeks. At the end of the six weeks, the students dispersed but continued their new, healthier habits and met one month later to assure weight loss was solid. They met one final time a month after that so final weigh-ins could be accomplished. That final weigh-in determined which individual had lost the greatest percentage of beginning body weight as well as designating which team of four had achieved the greatest percentage of loss. The individual winner was to win \$500 and the team would win \$1000.

Ninety people enrolled in the first series of Transformation Café classes. Half were distance learners. Those who completed succeeded remarkably. The winning individual student, Kristy Ping, lost 20.7% of her beginning body weight. The winning team comprised of Alicia McAuley, Nicole Vey, Donna Newton, and Chris Hudgeon collectively lost 14% of their starting weight.

The Transformation Café was successful enough that the next series of classes was to begin on Thursday, May 3. The next series of classes is open to the public

Contract Health News

Summer is fast approaching, therefore the Contract Health Services Department would like to encourage Tribal members who are eligible for CHS to have a current 2012 application on file. If you need to utilize your benefit, please follow the following instructions.

- For purchase order numbers, please call at least 2-3 days in advance.
- If you are going to see a new doctor or clinic, please call 5-7 days in advance so that CHS can process the vendor/ provider information.
- Should you require a root canal or crown, ask your provider for the total cost. The benefit for each calendar year is \$1,500. Should you exceed the benefit amount, you will be responsible for the balance.
- Should you require any type of surgery, you must receive prior authorization from the Resource Management Committee (RMC).
- Use of Ambulance and Emergency Room visits are for life threatening services such as shortness of breath, heart problems, strokes, high fever in small children, and major broken limbs.
- Please utilize Urgent Care for colds, rashes, sprains and other non-life threatening problems.

You will be sent an application to fill out and sign. You will be required to enclose a photo and mail the completed application back to the Government Office for processing. Properly filled out applications will be processed with the Tribal Chairman's signature and will be mailed back to you. Tribal I.D. cards are legal documents and are accepted as legal proof of identity.
