

Coquille's File Land-into-Trust Application for Medford Property

Governor Kitzhaber and officials of the City of Medford and Jackson County have all received a letter from the Bureau of Indian Affairs Regional Director, Stan Speaks, requesting comment on the proposed application by the Coquille Tribe of Indians to take 2.4 acres of land into trust status for the purpose of opening a "small" Class II casino operation in Medford. This property is more than 170 miles from the Coquille Headquarters in North Bend, Oregon on the coast. The Governor and the city of Medford have both made requests for an extension to respond to the application. Both have been granted by the BIA.



Existing Oregon tribal casinos operate Class "III" casinos, which mean "Nevada style" gaming is authorized. You are playing against the house. Class "II" games are such things as pull tabs, poker, keno and bingo. You are playing against other players. With modern technology, however, Class "II" slot machines have been developed to look and act nearly identical to a Class "III" machine. So much so that most customers wouldn't be able to tell a difference.

Coquille representatives have tried to downplay this fact by stating they will open a "small Class II operation,", as if it won't have a negative aeffect on both the Cow Creeks and the existing ?? state lottery retailers in the Medford area. The Seminole Tribe of Florida operate only Class "II" machines and were able to acquire both the Hard Rock Hotels and Cafe's worldwide on Class "II" revenues.



Preliminary studies have indicated that both the Tribe and lottery retailers would see as much as a 50% reduction in current revenues, severely harming existing lottery businesses and tribal programs.

The Medford area is less than 70 miles from Canyonville and is the #1 market for Seven Feathers Casino Resort. Revenues derived from Seven Feathers are

used to fund tribal health, social services, education, housing and economic development programs for members of Cow Creek.

The Coquille's have indicated that difficulty in funding their generous tribal programs and benefits for their membership has caused them to intrude into the Cow Creeks area. The Cow Creek Tribal Government can empathize and identify with budget shortfalls, however, intruding into another tribe's territory is simply unacceptable.

Every effort is being made by the Cow Creek Board and staff to block the Coquille effort, including preparation of a preemptive lawsuit to halt the process.

Lose the Belly Fat

We don't want to say that all those extra pounds make you less of a man, but obesity is linked to low levels of testosterone -- the sex hormone that puts hair on your chest, power in your muscles and oomph in your sex drive. Low testosterone can also wreak havoc on your energy levels, motivation and overall sense of well-being.

Belly Fat Promotes a Couch Potato Lifestyle, and Vice-Versa

Though it's possible to be fit and fat, 80% of people who are overweight or obese are not, says Noel Bairey-Merz, MD, director of the Preventive and Rehabilitative Cardiac Center at the Cedars-Sinai Heart Institute. The couch potato lifestyle can make reaching for the remote feel like an endurance event. Your muscles go flabby, and your heart and lungs can't deliver enough blood and oxygen to your body. More important than going on a diet to drop a few pounds, Bairey -Merz says, is exercising regularly. Do that and the weight will come off.

Losing Belly Fat Helps Relieve Joint and Back Pain

Obesity and inactivity can lead to and worsen back pain, achy joints, and arthritis. "Imagine putting a pack on your back and lugging it around," Katz says. "It wears you out. It hurts your back and your joints. You're always tired. That's what that excess weight is doing." If you lose weight, the pain will clear up. Luckily, small losses add up to big benefits. Losing just 1 pound of weight will take 4 pounds of stress off your joints.

Losing Belly Fat Helps Prevent Heart Disease and Diabetes

Belly fat is an independent risk factor for death from heart disease. What that means is, even if you get A's on the rest of your health report card, belly fat alone increases your risk of dying from a heart attack. Unfortunately, men who are prone to belly fat are also more likely to have more plaque in their arteries, inflammation, insulin resistance, type 2 diabetes, abnormal cholesterol levels, and/or heart disease or to suffer heart failure. Losing weight, not smoking, exercising and eating right can save you from that fate.



The OFN documents, supports and celebrates Oregon's traditional art forms and cultural practices. They strive to make a meaningful difference in communities by empowering tradition keepers to pass on their skills and knowledge. Through TAAP, OFN develops and implements high quality folk arts programming, raising public awareness about the wealth and value of Oregon's traditional arts and culture.

The Traditional Arts Apprenticeship Program recognizes the knowledge and skills of excellent folk & traditional artists and facilitates the transmission and preservation of traditional art forms between mentors and apprentices.

Folk & traditional arts express a community's heritage and cultural aesthetics. Communities may include ethnic, tribal, occupational, regional and religious groups. Individuals usually learn their culture's traditional arts over time, in face-to-face situations, and by observation and imitation.

High School Summer Education Programs



High School Journalism Institute is a unique program for Oregon and Southwest Washington high school students to get hands-on experience in the field of journalism. With guidance from professionals, the participants use real journalism skills to report, photograph and produce a 32-page newspaper. Students also contribute to a blog and produce multimedia pieces for The Oregonian's web site.

The eight-day, all-expenses-paid institute runs from July 20 to July 27 at the Oregon State University campus in Corvallis. Students stay in residential dorms on campus, work with professionals from The Oregonian, the Medford Mail Tribune, Corvallis Gazette-Times and other papers, and use state-of-the-art facilities.


Applicants are not required to have journalism experience, but need to have a genuine interest in journalism, writing, photography and/or multimedia.

More Education Opportunities for Teens

Oregon College of Art and Crafts 10th Annual A. Susana Santos' "Journeys in Creativity" Explorations in Native American Art Program is happening June 16th – 29th. This creative cultural exploration empowers and encourages twelve Native American teens to explore the richness of Native American contemporary art and craft through handson workshops, field trips and presentations.

This year's theme is "Honoring Our Past, Making Our Future." While living on campus, participating students will learn and experiment in 5 studio workshops in: drawing, painting, wood carving, ceramics and weaving. This program encourages creative expression. Participants receive guidance and instruction from Native American artists. Other daily activities include group meals, movies, field trips to local art museums and galleries, and visits to local book and art supply stores. In addition, there will be guest presentations by Native American artists. There is no charge to participating students accepted into the program. Students may also apply for a travel stipend to help offset travel costs.

Hello, Tribal members! The Natural Resources Department hopes that you are enjoying this winter and looking forward to the spring. This coming April, our Tribe has a wonderful opportunity available for Tribal members: The Salmon and Trout Enhancement Programs (STEP) Conference, an event being held Saturday, April 6th and Sunday, April 7th. This conference is being held at our very own Seven Feathers Casino Resort, and scholarships for about 10 members are available. The conference will be covering different aspects of STEP, including awareness of the program, volunteering, education and outreach and other subjects. This conference offers Tribal members an excellent opportunity to learn more about current salmon and

trout issues, and what they can do to help remedy the problems. Our very own Tribe is co-sponsoring this event.

The conference goes from 8 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. on Saturday, and includes both lunch and an optional awards dinner and silent auction. Saturday's schedule mainly consists of STEP partners and several programs including discussions on monitoring practices, community group based restoration activities and a focus on angler education. Sunday's schedule includes several possible field trips, including a trip to a hatch box facility (a place where salmon are raised) in Canyonville. Several other workshops will also be offered.

- Enrolled Member of the Cow Creek Band of Umpqua Tribe of Indians
- At least 16 Years old for all Non-Gaming Related Internships
- At least 21 years old for all internships
- Be enrolled in an educational establishment within the past 6 months

High School

- ⇒ Maintain a C or better grade point average
- ⇒ If under a C average, the student will need to work with employment services to acquire a tutor. While a student in good standing, working on improving their grade point average, may request a waiver of the GPA requirements.

College

- ⇒ Maintain a C or better grade point average
- Transportation to and from work sites
- Work up to 400 hours in a calendar year
- No fixed term internships with the Cow Creek Information Technology Department in the past 12 months

Gaming Related

- ⇒ Ability to acquire a Gaming License
- ⇒ Over 21 years of age

Properly filled out applications will be processed with the Tribal Chairman's signature and will be mailed back to you. Tribal I.D. cards are legal documents and are accepted as legal proof of identity.
