

The Tribal Administration is off to a very busy start in 2015. We have been managing several different important issues that have an impact on the Tribe and ultimately the membership.

Work on our reservation project continues in Washington DC. Passage of our bill was very close in the last session of Congress, but was bundled along with some controversial bills and failed to get passed out of the Senate. Senator Wyden and Congressmen DeFazio have assured us that our bill will again be dropped very soon this year.

We continue to fight the efforts of the Coquille Tribe to intercept our largest customer base by building a casino in Medford. This move is unprecedented and is over 170 miles from the Tribal Headquarters in North Bend on the coast and from their homeland. So far this year, the BIA has initiated the NEPA (Environmental Impact Study) for the proposed project and has held one meeting in Medford. The initial meeting was only to develop a scoping document that will determine all issues that will be studied. Tribal staff was organized to attend this hearing simply as an effort to sway media coverage in our favor. There will be subsequent meetings in the future that tribal members will be called upon to attend and possibly testify.

The Tribal Board of Directors just completed their annual informational meeting with tribal members in both Kelso and Port Angeles, Washington. The meetings were well attended by tribal membership where they received information that was presented to the General Council in February in Roseburg.

I was able to attend the swearing in ceremony for Oregon's new Governor, Kate Brown. Oregon tribes are fortunate to have such an advocate as Kate becoming Governor. There is a long history of advocacy from Kate Brown for the tribes in the House and Senate, as well as the Secretary of State's office.

**WHY:** Mental health challenges – such as depression, anxiety, psychosis and substance use – are shockingly

common in the United States. In fact, more than one in five American adults will have a mental health problem in any given year. The National Council for Behavioral Health certifies individuals throughout

the nation to provide Mental Health First Aid courses to prepare their communities with the

knowledge and skills to help individuals who are developing a mental health problem or experiencing a mental health crisis. Identified on SAMHSA's National Registry of Evidence-Based Programs and Practices, the training helps the public better identify, understand and respond to signs of mental illnesses.

# **Tribal Legislative Day at the State Capitol**



State employees, elected officials and visitor's to the Capitol building had the opportunity to visit the nine Oregon Tribes' information tables. The theme was "Oregon is Indian Country: Say Hello to Your Neighbors." The main objective of this event is to inform legislators, legislative staff, state employees and the general public about Oregon's tribes, including its priorities, culture, and programs. At noon, the Native American Rehabilitation Association of the Northwest served fry bread on the Capitol steps. The annual event is sponsored by the Legislative Commission on Indian Services and the nine

federally recognized Tribes in Oregon and was held on February 19th.

The 40th anniversary celebration of the Legislative Commission on Indian Services is set for Thursday, May 14th at 9a.m. at the State Capitol. May 11th – 15th is American Indian Week in Oregon.

# **Cultural Arts Revitalization Project**

#### IT'S A GREAT WAY TO SHARPEN YOUR CREATIVE TRADITONAL SKILLS OR LEARN SOME NEW ONES...

The Project goal is to provide opportunities for Cow Creek Tribal members to research and learn the practices of the Cow Creek Band of Umpqua Tribe's traditional cultural arts. Our tribal members over the past 165 years have suffered cultural trauma and have been distanced from some of our traditional life-ways including general knowledge about traditional foods, medicines, the Takelma language, and fishing and hunting techniques, as well as, our ways of making clothing, basketry, tools, utensils and other traditional arts.

We have a definite need to conduct research and develop the skills of tribal members who are interested in learning and teaching these important tribal ways so they can be passed down to our children, grandchildren and beyond.

The opportunity to be a volunteer, informational researcher and/or a participant in workshops, conferences and trainings is open to all ages. Pre-approved travel, food, lodging and fees will be paid on the tribal member's behalf. It is not necessary to live within the 7 county service area to participate.

# **Tribal Election Coming Up**

The Tribal General Council Nominations Meeting is scheduled for Sunday, May 17<sup>th</sup> at 10 a.m.

The Tribal General Council Elections Meeting is scheduled for Sunday, August 9<sup>th</sup> at 10 a.m.

All General Council Meetings will be held at the Cow Creek Tribal Government Offices located at 2371 NE Stephens Street, Roseburg, OR.

The procedures for the nominations for the Tribal Board of Directors Election are as follows: Any registered voter of the Tribe present at the May meeting each year may nominate. Each person may nominate one individual for the election in August. **Reminder:** Nominees must be present at the Nomination Meeting to accept their nomination. When nominations are closed, no other nominations will be accepted. A nomination will be considered complete when the nominee has accepted the nomination in writing. Nomination acceptance forms will be furnished to all candidates present at the meeting.

Candidate acceptance forms will be placed on the ballot in the order the nominations were made. Ballot packets including instructions will be mailed out to registered voters of the Tribe from Wicks Emmett, CPA by July 9<sup>th</sup> and are due back to Wicks Emmett by August 7<sup>th</sup>. If you are a registered Tribal voter and do not receive a ballot, contact the Government Office at 541-672-9405 or 1-800-929-8229 to request one be mailed to you.

Tribal members are encouraged to maintain an updated registration card including a signature, as well as keeping an up-to-date address on file. Any new or updated voter registration card needs to be completed and turned in to the Government Office by May 15, 2015. **Reminder:** Voter Registration is closed from May 15<sup>th</sup> thru August 9<sup>th</sup> 2015.

As with Federal, State and local elections, tribal members must register to vote in the Tribal Board of Directors elections. Registration is only required once. If you have been married, divorced and have changed your name a new registration form needs to be completed and turned in to the Government Office. If you would like to register to vote, you may call the Government Office to request an application be sent to you.





# **Tribal Down Payment and Repair Assistance Reporting**

As some of you may or may not know, the majority of our Housing Programs are funded with our HUD grant as well as Tribal money. When applying for assistance all Tribal members that accepted the grant on behalf of the Tribe agreed to maintain possession and provide proof of residency for a period of 5- 10 years depending on which program they applied for. These rules are not just those imposed by the Tribe, but are also impart some of the regulations that we are obligated to monitor and report to HUD.

All Tribal members that have received funding for Down Payment and Repair Assistance are to provide proof of residency to the Housing Program the first part of January each year for a period of 5 years.

Tribal members that have received IHBG Down Payment and Repair Assistance are to provide proof of residency to the Housing Program the first part of January each year for a period of 10 years, as well as proof of homeowners and fire insurance. At this time it would be appreciated if Tribal members that received assistance in the last 5 years could contact the Tribal Housing Program to verify possession of the properties they have received assistance. This could be in the form of providing a copy of your respected most recent property tax statement, homeowners insurance or utility statement showing the address of the property for which you received assistance. # Esther Lorraine Gatewood - August 26, 1919 - March 4, 2015

MILL CITY, OR - Esther Lorraine Davis, 95, died March 4 in Stayton. She was born in Glendale, OR and lived in Grants Pass, OR until moving to Mill City, OR in 1960. Esther married Robert Gatewood on February 1, 1939 in Grants Pass, OR; he preceded her in death in 1999. She was a member of the Eagles Lodge and the Gleaners for 12 years. In her younger days, Esther worked in the fields with hops, gladiolas, and berries, and later was a bartender for over 30 years. She enjoyed doing beadwork jewelry, crocheting, sewing, hiking, hunting, swimming and telling jokes. She was the eldest of the Cow Creek Band of Umpqua Tribe of Indians and was very proud of her Indian heritage.

Esther is survived by her children: Iva (Ed) Davenport of Detroit, OR; Roxie (Orvis) Guenther of Phoenix, OR; and Denace (Rhonda) Gatewood of Stayton, OR; 17 grandchildren, 38 great-



grandchildren, and 30 great-great-grandchildren. She was preceded in death by brothers: Ernest Davis, Albert (Nip) Davis, Ellis Buschmann Jr, and Gordon Buschmann; sister: Hazel Lycett; and grandchildren: Greg Delay and Loreena Guenther. A memorial service will be Saturday, March 14, 2015 at 2:00 pm at Brookdale Assisted Living in Stayton, OR (formerly Lakeside Assisted Living) at 2201 N. 3rd Ave. Stayton. Interment will be at a later date at the Masonic Cemetery in Canyonville, OR. North Santiam Funeral Services is providing family services.
