Saturday also featured the Grand Entry, where many Cow Creek Tribal members were able to show off their hand-crafted regalia while walking or dancing to the beat of several Tribal drumming circles. Cow Creek member Alan Mata had the honor of acting as Arena Director.

On July 12, 2017, the Tribe officially opened the doors of its latest business venture: the Takelma Roasting Company. The business is named after the Cow Creek Tribe's native language, and features Takelma words on the front door.

Over 30 people attended the ribbon-cutting ceremony, including various members of the Cow Creek Board of Directors. Guests were able to sample selections of this coffee, along with treats made by Seven Feathers Executive Chef Mark Henry, and were given a demonstration of how the coffee beans are rosted.

The idea for this business was conceived when Hotel Hospitality staff were reviewing and exploring cost-saving measures regarding how much coffee is consumed at the casino. We believe the Takelma Roasting Co. has the potential to become a successful business for the Tribe.

"We have a lot of venues that offer coffee," said Tribal Chairman Dan Courtney. "It seemed a fair fit."

"This all came about because we have good employees who have good ideas," said Business Operations Officer John McCafferty.

Takelma Roasting Company offers three initial roast profiles: Bold, Mild, and Decaf. If all goes well, they plan to expand the selection in the future. You can find their coffee at any Tribal business, such as the Seven Feathers Casino. You can also order coffee and merchandise directly from www.takelmaroasting.com. If Tribal members use the code "tribal member" (case sensitive) on an online order, they will get a 15% discount on the whole order!







Tribal Households Get Prepared During September- National Preparedness Month

One fact that we all know-but sometimes don't like to think or talk about—are the unexpected events that can place us or our families in dire situations with little or no notice. Disasters can be large or small. They can impact single households, communities or whole regions. For this reason, the federal government has designated September as National Preparedness Month (NPM).

We can all take action to prepare! We are all able to help first responders in our community by training on how to respond during an emergency and what to do when disaster strikes — where we live, work, and visit. The goal of NPM is to increase the overall number of individuals, families, and communities that engage in preparedness actions at home, work, businesses, school, and places of worship.

In keeping with the National Preparedness Goals, and in recognition of National Preparedness Month, and with the recommendation of Michael Rondeau, Tribal CEO, the Cow Creek Band of Umpqua Tribe of Indians Board has decided to provide each Tribal Head of Household with a Survival Kit designed to provide the basic resources that would be needed to survive the immediate aftermath of an unexpected event. These survival kits are to give Tribal Households a starting point to begin to prepare for a disaster when access to usual resources might be disrupted.

Each Tribal Head of Household will receive a prepackaged survival kit in the coming weeks. The kits will be shipped directly to the Head of Household. The links at the end of the article can help households begin to prepare for specific types of disasters, develop family communication plans

The September newsletter will contain information on preparing for emergencies in Northwest Tribal Nations. Tribal Member Highlight: Tony Sanchez

Tribal member Tony Sanchez was inducted into Washington state's Clark Community College's Hall of Fame on February 20, 2016. Then, in June of this year, was also inducted into the Northwest Athletic Conference (NWAC) Hall of Fame along with his 2017 Men's Clark Community College soccer teammates. The 2017 Clark men's soccer season was the most successful season and only championship win to date for the college's men's soccer team.

When introduced at the Clark College induction, Tony's coach mentioned Tony's ability to draw other players into fouling him. This ability gave the team the opportunity for a foul shot with only 59 seconds of overtime left on the clockafoul shot that won them the game.

A teammate explained the team's overall success perfectly at the ceremony: "There is no one star on the team. It works because every one of us works together towards the same goal, doing whatever is needed and never giving up."

From day one, Tony and his teammates gave everything they had. The final championship game was hard fought, going into double overtime and ending with a golden goal.





14th Annual CRIHB & NPAIHB Meeting

Over three days during July, the Seven Feathers Casino hosted the 14th Annual California Rural Indian Health Board (CRIHB) & Northwest Portland Area Indian Health Board (NPAIHB) Board of Directors Meeting. It was an incredible meeting of Tribal elders, youth, delegates, and families from over 70 Federally recognized Tribes from all over the west. At the final Joint Meeting of the delegates, they worked together on healthcare issues, legislation, and resolutions for the northwest and California regions.

Meanwhile, Tribal youth attended a Youth Leadership Workshop, where they met youth from other Tribes, learned about traditional stick games, leadership tactics, and more. They also attended cultural arts classes where they learned about herbs and crafted bracelets, necklaces, decorative sticks, natural balms and creams.

Messages from the Clinic

Kids and Wheeled Sports Safety

According to <u>safekids.org</u>, nearly 50 children visit emergency departments (ED) each hour with an injury related to bikes, scooters, skates, or skateboards.

Although fractures to the shoulder, arm, elbow, wrist, or hand, were the most frequent diagnoses for hospital admissions, very serious head injuries such as concussions, internal injuries, and serious fractures still made up 11% of visits to ED related to bikes, scooters, skates, and skateboards.

The problem is linked to children not wearing helmets when participating in wheeled sport events. Almost 40% of parents of children aged 5-14 years said that their child did not always wear a helmet when biking, skating, or riding scooters or skateboards. In addition, only 38% of parents who ride bikes and don't wear helmets report their children wear helmets. This is a staggering statistic that shows that children follow the example set by their parents. Indeed, the study showed that 86% of parents who wear helmets while biking said their children always wear helmets as well.

Why don't children wear helmets? Studies indicate that 22% think that helmets aren't cool; 24% don't because other children don't wear them; 27% say they find them uncomfortable; and a tremendous 47% don't wear helmets because their parents think the area is safe, that their child is experienced enough, or that helmets are unneccesary.

Parents, keep your children safe by having them wear a helmet. All riders should be wearing a properly-fitted helmet, as it is the best way to prevent head injuries and death. Ensuring that helmets fit correctly can increase their comfort and use. For children that ride scooters, skates, and skateboards, wrist guards and elbow/knee pads are recommended.

Things to know about Purchased & Referred Care (PRC)

- It is important to read the newsletter monthly for updates and details on Purchased & Referred Care.
- It is the members' responsibility to call for Purchase Order (PO) numbers 2-3 days in advance.
- You have 72 hours after an emergent or urgent visit to the hospital or urgent care that occurs after PRC business hours.
- If it is a new facility or doctor, call 7 days in advance so PRC can get them set up in the system.
- Please remind the provider that PRC is a payor of last resort and to bill your primary insurance first.
- The number one reason a claim is denied is because there is no Purchase Order on file.
- A PO is date sensitive. It is only for the date of service it is issued for. If you get rescheduled you need to call us and get a new PO number.
- Providers will not be able to call and obtain a PO number for the member. It is the members' responsibility to call and get the PO number.
- Remember to always make sure the provider has PRC's billing information. This is the main reason you receive a bill from them or may get turned into collections. You may need to call the lab (Quest, LabCorp), as the information doesn't always transfer over from your provider.
- If you are turning 18, please remember to contact PRC so that we may explain the process to you (eligibility, application, school, etc.).

The Teach My Preschooler Kit (ages 3-4) has everything necessary for encouraging reading for kids and teaching preschoolers the basics. It is designed to give preschoolers an early head start, develop fine motor skills, encourage parent-child interaction, and increase school readiness skills.

The Teach My Kindergartener Kit (ages 4-5) is an all-in-one learning kit that contains unique and coordinated tools to teach spelling, money, telling time, sequencing and logic, and beginner reading. Detailed instructions come with each kit, and the Education Department is also available to answer any questions regarding how to best implement this new and effective learning resource.

Youth Education Program Benefits


It's that time of year again when parents pack up the kids and head to the local store to purchase the dreaded school supplies. Did you know that Tribal Children between 3 years and 18 years of age can receive up to \$275 in reimbursement per calendar year for school supplies, school and sport fees, as well as any other educational activity that has a fee attached to it? This includes, but is not limited to the rental of musical instruments, uniform and equipment costs, preschool fees, and many other programs not mentioned. Services of this program cover parental costs of up to \$275 per Tribal child per calendar year. So, save your receipts!

Forms can be downloaded on the Cow Creek Website under Forms and Contacts and from the Cow Creek Education Website. Look for the "YEP Application", and the "YEP Parent Request Forms". 2017 Firewood Program

Firewood permits will only be issued on Tuesday & Wednesday of each week to Tribal members on a first-come, first-served basis. Firewood is \$55.00 per cord with a 2-cord limit annually.



Tribal Elders receive their first cord free. Firewood must be paid for and a firewood permit issued prior to picking up firewood. All firewood must be picked up by no later than September 30, 2017. Please contact Janet Perkins at (541) 677-5575 or jperkins@cowcreek.com to request a pass.

Low Income Rental Housing

The Cow Creek Housing Program is accepting applications for the Tribe's Low Income Rental homes. This program is federally funded through the Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Indian Housing Block Grant (IHBG), and is administered by the Tribe.

This program can assist eligible Tribal members who are willing to reside in one of the Tribe's low-income rental units. Priority is given to families with the greatest needs in relation to income, family size, age, disabilities, etc.

Reminder: If you are currently on the waiting list for a house, please make sure that your address and phone number are up to date. If your name is coming up on the list and we cannot get a hold of you, we will be forced to pass you by until we hear from you. Remember that if you are on the waiting list, your application needs to be updated on a biannual basis.

Make Sure Your Address Is Current for Distribution Checks

If your address has changed, then you need to make sure the Government Office knows about it; otherwise, you may not receive your distribution check in November.

To update your address, mail a Change of Address form to the address on the form, or fax it to 541-677-5565. Those with minor children not living in their households, make sure that the childrens' updated addresses are on file at the Tribal Government Office to allow for proper notification of events and Trust Fund information. Weavers, Watch for Harvestable Plants

As the end of summer approaches, many plants can be harvested for use in traditional cultural arts.

In August, maiden hair fern is nearing the perfect state for gathering for use in crafts.

In September, it will be time to gather river willow sticks, which can be used in all sorts of weaving. Willow can also be gathered during springtime.

Additional plants that could be ready during this time are iris, river -sage, beargrass (only from high elevations) and maple bark.

When you go out to River willow sticks gather, please take plenty of water, clippers, gloves, shovels, buckets or bags, and other necessary tools. Most of all, be safe!

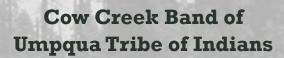
