Letter from the Chairman

As we come to the end of the first-quarter of 2018, staff continues to work diligently on the Western Oregon Tribal Fairness Act also known as the Cow Creek Land Conveyance. Before the tribal reservation land is officially turned over to the Tribe, an agreement between the Tribe, BLM, and the BIA must be completed. The law provides for 180 days for this transaction to begin. A coordinated effort between all three entities is underway.

The work to gain the Western Oregon Tribal Fairness Act was no easy task. There were great efforts by many people and especially the Oregon Congressional Delegation. Without the support of Oregon's Senators and Congressmen, this transfer of over 17,000 acres would have never happened. Over the years, it has been obvious that maintaining these strong political relationships has been incredibly important. Senator Wyden often refers to the Cow Creek Tribe as "his" Tribe and we can all be proud to be held up as a model by the Oregon Congressional Delegation.

We can all be proud of the Cow Creek Government Office and the Seven Feathers Casino Resort for recently winning two distinguished awards from two Chambers of Commerce in Southern Oregon. In January, the Seven Feathers Casino Resort was

Be on the lookout for changes to the Seven Feathers Truck and Travel. Plans are nearing completion for an improved entry to the gas pumps area. Another project is anticipated to begin in September of this year, with the installation of new pumps that contain updated software for chipped credit and debit cards.

On another note, Tribal leaders once again traveled to Washington State to meet with the tribal membership in both the Kelso and Port Angeles areas. This annual event provides an opportunity for tribal members who reside outside the tribal service area to interact and discuss current issues with the Tribal Board of Directors as well as raise any concerns or questions regarding tribal government, current events and tribal programs. This trip also allows tribal staff an opportunity to present reports on important programs. Many good questions were discussed and the Tribal Board is committed to open discussions and working together with tribal members on issues of importance.

Additionally, I would like to give a reminder about voter registration. If you have not registered to vote, please stop by or call the office for a Tribal voter registration application. If you are currently registered, it is a good idea to update your registration every 10 years or so as signatures (used for verification) often change with time.

Remember the next General Council Meeting is always held on the 3rd Sunday in May each year, due to Mother's Day. Other General Council meetings are always held on the second Sunday of February, August and November. The meetings are at 10 AM with lunch to follow. Hope to see you there.

Umpqua Community College Dedicates Taphòythá Hall

Despite the heavy rain, quite a few people attended the dedication of Umpqua Community College's (UCC) newest building: Taphòythá Hall. The building sits on the site formerly inhabited by Snyder Hall, the location of the tragedy on October 1, 2015.

"There are still a lot of emotions as students remember what happened," said UCC President Debra Thatcher, "and this is a really important part of our healing process."

The building's name (Taphòythá, pronounced duh-POY-tuh) is a Takelma word meaning "to be blessed and to prosper." It honors the Cow Creek Tribe, who have long supported UCC, as well as the community. Rhonda Richardson had the honor of giving a dedicatory Takelma prayer before the ribbon cutting.

"It's a statement that we're not defined by the past," said Thatcher. "This is a new beginning for us, and it really does symbolize our optimism and hope for the future."

Though the building bearing his name was destroyed and replaced by Taphòythá Hall after the tragedy, UCC still honors Ralph Snyder, one of the college's original administrators, as it has renamed the nearby fountain after him.

Tribal Member Joins NARA Dental Team

In 2009, Cow Creek Tribal member Ben Steward graduated from the Alaska Dental Therapist Education Program. Since then, he has worked in Alaska as a Dental Health Aide Therapist (DHAT), providing dental services for local Alaskan Native communities. The work he and other DHATs like him have done ha increased dental health drastically in Alaskan communities, according to a study by the University of Washington. Now, however, he has moved back to Oregon to join the Native American Rehabilitation Association (NARA), who have been expanding their team to make it easier for Oregonians to get access to oral health care. This and Ben's contributions are part of Oregon's Dental Pilot Project Program.

The Portland-based and Native American-owned NARA is a non-profit agency that offers many varieties of health care to American Indians and Alaskan Natives (AI/AN) in the greater Portland area. What



was once a small outpatient substance abuse treatment center has now become a much greater entity, capable of supplying residential family treatment, child and family services, mental health services, and more. Ben's addition to the NARA team will allow the agency to take their care places it couldn't before.

Blessing the Elk Restoration Project

The Cow Creek Natural Resources Department has begun a project called the "Dole Road Elk Population Dynamics and Habitat Utilization Study," which will allow them to develop and deploy strategies for elk conservation management on their Dole Road property. This 36-month project recognizes the historical importance of elk for the Tribe and will focus on generating information that can be used to conserve their population.

The Cultural Department was present on the first day of the project to provide a traditional blessing for the project. This included a Takelma prayer, a smudge, and an offering of tobacco (seen right). Several Board members also attended to show their support.

April Is Alcohol Awareness Month

According to the 2016 Oregon Student Wellness Survey, students in Douglas County are more likely to have consumed alcohol than their peers across the state. The same survey shows that our kids feel that it is "easy" or "very easy" to get alcohol (70% of 11th graders), and they are more likely to have ridden with an impaired driver or drove impaired themselves. Alcohol is one of the leading causes of criminal behavior among youth, is one of the leading factors in teenage suicide, and is involved in over 50% of sexual assaults.

The National Council on Alcoholism and Drug Dependence (NCADD) is promoting April 2018 as Alcohol Awareness month. This year's theme is "Changing Attitudes: It's not a rite of passage." The Cow Creek Health & Wellness Center will be honoring this theme by raising awareness wherever they can. They will encourage parents to talk with their kids early and often about alcohol use, and will be holding a "Sticker Shock" event in the Truck & Travel Store, regarding the legal consequences of supplying alcohol to underage kids.

Takelma Language Corner

Our Takelma language ancestors recognized family titles a little differently than what Tribal members do today. The grandparents would have been addressed in the following manner.

Wihàm – my Father (We hahm) Wihín– my Mother (Wee-heen)

Bear Grass Apron

Bear Grass is braided or wrapped to make the apron of our traditional regalia more beautiful or attractive. The amount of bear grass braids chosen to put on the apron differs between dresses and dress makers.



Salmon Ceremony Swimmers Needed

The Cultural Program is looking for young men ages 10-15 years old to be a part of the Salmon Ceremony at this year's Culture Camp on June 16. The Salmon Ceremony is a time honored tradition to honor Haapk'emná's (the Creator). Young men who are strong swimmers take the bones of the first salmon, along with the prayers of the members, to the river to return to Haapk'emná's. Look What's Blooming in the Túu Yap'a Xumá Tribal Gardens!

Tíiph (pronounced deep) is blooming! Last fall one of the raised beds at the Túu Yap'a Xumá Tribal Garden was planted full of tíiph (camas - Camassia quamash). This first bloom is surprisingly short to the ground. Tíiph was one of our important first foods. To collect it, women would take a camas digging stick,



made from fire hardened yew wood and an antler for the handle and dig into the ground. The bulb would pop up and be tossed into their burden basket. After collecting a large amount, the bulbs would be cooked in the pit oven for 24-48 hours. The sweet sticky goodness could be eaten right away or pounded into cakes and dried for later use. The taste comes as a cross between a sweet potato and an onion. The plot at the Tribal garden will be cultivated and cared for to be harvested sometime in the future. Come take a look at them the next time you are down at the garden. Be on the lookout for camas to be coming into bloom soon.

Keèt^h (bear grass - Xeriphyllum tenax) was planted in the Túu Yap'a Xumá Tribal Garden this last fall. It survived the couple of cold snowy weeks and is looking good. Keèt^h is used as an overlay in basketry and to make bear grass braids. To harvest the new middle shoots are taken in mid-summer. The



blades of the grass are sharp, so it is recommended to wear gloves when harvesting. After harvest, lay out the grass in the sun to bleach. You know they are ready when they are a creamy white color. To use, soak in warm water to make flexible.

Colorectal Cancer: Numbers to Know

Colorectal cancer (cancer of the colon or rectum) is one of the most common cancers in the U.S. but it doesn't have to be. There are several screening tests for it, and some tests can also remove growths before they have a chance to turn into cancer.

Most people at average risk for colorectal cancer should get regular screenings beginning at age 50. If you think you're at higher risk—because of your family history, for example—ask your doctor if you should be screened at an earlier age. The infographic on the right breaks down colorectal cancer by the numbers.


340B Pharmacy

If you use PRC for prescription drugs, it would be beneficial to the Tribe if you utilized Cow Creek Health & Wellness Center for your care and Hometown Pharmacy for all of your RX needs. This saves the Tribe money on health expenses every year, which benefits all the Tribe members by extending PRC usage. Other benefits for choosing Tribal services include: home delivery, delivery to south Clinic, and Nesika paying up to 3 month's supply of medication.

Are You Using Your Teladoc Membership?

The flu and cold season continues and many are having to spend hours at their doctor's office, an urgent care or even the ER. Do you want to spend the time to go to your medical provider when you could still get medical care sitting at home, while you are at work, or even on vacation? Then please give Teladoc a try. It is only a phone call away, and within an estimated 16-17 minutes, you can talk to a medical provider with over 10 years of credible medical experience. A great many of our employees and Tribal members who have used this service have saved time and money, and really love this service.

There is no cost to you unless there is a prescription that is needed, and then it would be the prescription co-pay amount. The deductible does not have to be met before you can use this service.

It is highly recommended that a medical history be completed for anyone who would like to use this benefit prior to the need for Teladoc services. The medical history is just like filling out the forms at a medical provider's office. The doctor needs to have your medical and prescription information in order to provide great medical care. All of this information is confidential and is only reviewed by the treating medical provider at Teladoc.

This benefit is not to take the place of your physician or if there is an emergency, to replace emergency care. This is a benefit that can be used for flu, cold, upper respiratory infections, bladder infections, and many more conditions. When completing the on-line registration, you will be prompted to input Nesika's name. The name you must use is "Nesika Health Group Corp".

Nesika Open Enrollment Approaching

Please note that there has been a change to the open enrollment end date. Open enrollment will be from June 1st through June 14th.

Nesika Health Group is the self-funded health insurance that is provided to all eligible employees and Tribal members that choose to participate and pay the monthly premium. The Annual Open Enrollment Month for Nesika Health Group is in the month of June.

Annual Open enrollment is the one time of the year that you can make changes without having a qualifying event. (The qualifying events are: marriage, birth, adoption, divorce, and death.) The

changes that you can make are to add or delete your spouse or dependents to or from the plan, or change the elected coverage. Newly-elected Plan coverage will become effective on July 1st.

If you are interested in receiving enrollment information, please call the Nesika office at 541-677-5508 or 800-284-9917. A packet will be mailed to you. The required information must be returned in to the Nesika office no later than June 14, 2018, for coverage to take effect on July 1st.

Government and Programs

Low-Income Tribal Housing

The Housing Department is excited to announce the completion of the first three homes in our new Tri-City housing development. The first two houses are three bedroom, two bathroom with a 2-car garage. The third house has two bedrooms, two bathrooms, and a 2-car garage. Construction is already underway on the next three homes.

The three new homes have been offered to Tribal members on our waiting list. As existing homes are vacated and new homes built, additional members on the waiting list will be placed in homes. Placement on the waiting list is based on the composition of the household with priority given to Elders, disabled individuals, and veterans.

If you're interested in renting a house in a Tribal neighborhood, we encourage you to apply as soon as possible. The current wait time for a home is approximately six months. Eligibility for the program is based on household size and total household income before taxes: Household income cannot be more than 80% of the average income for our area. Eligible applicants are approved by the Cow Creek Tribal Housing Review Board for placement on the Waiting List based on a calculation of their priority points.

Rent for Tribal housing is also based on total household income, but is never more than the current maximum for the house size: Current maximum rents are \$700/month for a two-bedroom, \$800/month for a three-bedroom, and

\$900/month for a four-bedroom. Residents are responsible for power, water, sewer, and natural gas charges (not all homes have natural gas). The Housing Department provides garbage service for all Tribal Housing homes.

The following employment opportunities are available for Tribal youth through the Tribal Youth Employment Opportunity Program:

<u>Clerical/Front Receptionist</u>: Provides secretarial and customer service support to the Government Offices front reception area. Works Monday - Friday, 10 AM - 2 PM. Must be 16+ years old.

Housing Department Administrative Support: Part-time (20-28 hours per week) position to provide administrative clerical support to the Housing Department's Administration Assistant. Completes tasks of various complexity to support the Housing Programs with 1 - 50 participants each. Tasks include physical/electronic filing, mass mailing, scanning and editing documents, and reviewing and organizing applications. Must be willing to accept new tasks and challenges.

<u>"Limited" Laborer</u>: Provides on-site "limited" labor to the Wiili Housing's housing development project located in South County, including landscape maintenance and general construction labor. Additional "limited" labor support to the new Tribal Community Center located in Tri-City.

<u>Tribal Community Center Program Assistant</u>:
Provides educational and supervisory assistance to the Tribal Community Center Staff and summer program, and works with youth. Must have valid driver's license and current Food Handlers Card (Tribal Workforce Development program can provide assistance with the Food Handlers card, if needed).

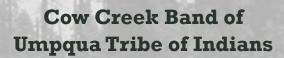
