Next Cancer Awareness Dinner in Redmond on May 24

The Cow Creek Health & Awareness Center will hold its next Cancer Information Dinner at the Travelodge New Redmond Hotel in Redmond, Oregon, on Friday, May 24, from 5-9 p.m. Two Cancer Awareness Dinners, one in Roseburg in November and one in Medford on March 15, have already been held by the Wellness Center.

The dinners are part of a cancer information/cancer prevention program the Wellness Center has developed as part of its commitment to satisfy the requirements of a National Cancer Institute grant.

The Awareness Dinners begin at 5 p.m. with a social hour and a tour of information trade show booths. Dinner and program begin at 6 p.m. Both health care specialists and cancer survivors participate in the program. According to Andrea Davis, Community Health Representative for the Cow Creek Health & Wellness Center,

That, along with the professional advice the health care professionals deliver at these events, makes for an information packed evening. I'm sure the Redmond dinner will also be successful."

Additional Over-the-Counter (OTC) Program Details

The Cow Creek Health & Wellness Center's Over-the-Counter (OTC) Tribal Prevention Program, approved in 1998, provides cost coverage for preventative health care products that can be purchased over the counter. Dental floss, cotton balls, and mouthwash are examples of products currently approved by the OTC program. Enrolled Tribal members are eligible to receive \$100 worth of qualifying products each year.

Sonicare toothbrushes, both individual and family models, may be purchased at reduced prices at the Wellness Center. Replacement heads and chargers are also available. The cost of these toothbrushes is deducted from the \$100 annual allowance allotted each Tribal member.

Enrolled Tribal members may receive coverage for tobacco cessation and delousing products. Housing for 62 and Older in Myrtle Creek

People aged 62 or older, including Tribal Elders, in need of affordable housing and who want to live in Douglas County may be eligible for residency in the Plaza Retirement Community located in the Creek, Oregon. Plaza Retirement Community is a modern, three-story building with 24 one-bedroom apartments. The facility has an elevator, mail delivery, a laundry, as well as paid water, sewer, and garbage.

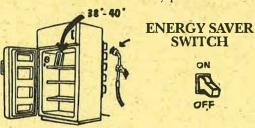
Tenants pay 30% of their adjusted gross income (income after medical expenses are deducted from gross income) for rent. Rent may also be adjusted throughout the year to accommodate unexpected medical expenses. Similar housing units are available in the Reedsport and Roseburg, Oregon areas. Keep the Refrigerator Cool!

These suggestions are passed on as tips to help you conserve energy and to potentially lower your heating bill.

A refrigerator can work more efficiently if a person:

- 1.) Vacuums the coils on the back or underneath the refrigerator twice a year. This will need to be done more often if you have pets in your home.
- 2.) A good temperature setting for a refrigerator is 38° 40° Fahrenheit. Check the accuracy of a refrigerator's temperature by placing a thermometer inside the unit and checking its reading against the refrigerator's temperature dial. A freezer unit should be set for 0° Fahrenheit.
- 3.) Turn off the refrigerator's gasket heater. Set the "Energy Saver" switch to winter or off. The Energy Saver switch is usually next to the temperature dial.
- 4.) A refrigerator or freezer that's plugged in but isn't being used is an energy draw. Unplug it. These unused units should be recycled or, if stored, the doors need to be removed as a safety precaution.

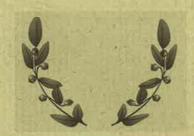

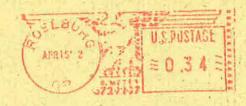
