Tribal General Elections

The nominations for these positions were taken at the May 16, 2004 General Council Meeting.

This year's election was again conducted with the assistance of the Bureau of Indian Affairs and the Tribal Election Committee.

The Tribal Election Committee consisted of Rhonda Malone, Shirley Roane, Andrea Davis, Michael Rondeau and Tammy Woodruff. The results of the 2004 Tribal Board of Directors election are: Sue Shaffer and



Dan Courtney.
They were reelected to serve a four-year term.

Secondhand Smoke

When you are exposed to smoke it is called secondhand smoke. There are two types of secondhand smoke; side-stream and mainstream.

Sidestream is the smoke from the burning end of a cigarette and mainstream is smoke exhaled from the lungs of a smoker. Sidestream has a higher concentration of toxic chemicals than mainstream because it is finer therefore being breathed deeper into the non-smokers lungs.

Studies have shown that children exposed to cigarette smoke in the home have more upper respiratory infections and more difficulty recovering from these infections. These children have more problems with chronic cough and chronic middle-ear infections as well. Secondhand smoke is a strong respiratory irritant and can cause or worsen respiratory conditions: asthma, COPD and allergies.

Children in households where one or both parents smoke have twice the amount of bronchitis, pneumonia and are hospitalized more frequently before their first birthday than children of non-smoking parents. If both parents smoke, teens are more likely to become smokers them-

Smoke Free Functions

Due to the over whelming studies of the effects of secondhand smoke, the Cow Creek Health & Wellness Center has gained support of the Cow Creek Tribal Board of Directors to have all 'Johnson O'Malley' functions be 'smoke free'. This does not exclude the use of traditional tobacco. The Cow Creek tribe does not wish to impede the use of tobacco for healing or prayer.

The first smoke free event was Culture Camp; appreciatively, no one was observed smoking. The staff for the Health & Wellness Center would like to thank the Cow Creek Tribal Members for supporting this effort.

Steps To Avoid Secondhand Smoke

- Keep your home free of secondhand smoke by having guests and family smoke outside.
- Do not smoke or allow others to smoke in your automobile.
- Sit in non-smoking sections of public areas (restaurants, airports, shopping malls, etc).

Injury Prevention Program

The Cow Creek Health & Wellness Center has been awarded an Injury Prevention Grant of \$10,000.00 from the Portland Indian Health Services. The Injury Prevention Grant is designed to enhance car seat safety for Cow Creek Tribal families.

The Oregon State Child Safety Law, effective January 1, 2002 states that children in an automobile under 6 years of age or under 60 pounds are required to be properly secured in a child safety seat or booster seat.

Injury Prevention Program Process:

•During the initial contact with

the Program Coordinator, a questionnaire (available over the phone) will be given to determine the weight/height/age of the child, and further questions determining eligibility and the appropriate car seat for the child.

- •After the proper type of seat has been determined, the applicant will receive a packet with car seat safety information, a check off list, a self addressed stamped envelope and a car seat safety clinic schedule for the area. A purchase order will be faxed to a participating store convenient to the applicant where the appropriate car seat may be picked up.
- •When meeting with the technician at the selected location, he/she will complete the check off list form. The final step is to return the completed form in the return envelope to the Cow Creek Health & Wellness Center within 14 business days. By complying with the Program Coordinator the Tribal family will be entitled to the next upgraded car seat based on the child's growth.

EDUCATION PROGRAM

Adult Education is available for Cow Creek Tribal members who live within the 7-county service area. The Adult Education assistance is intended for employment enhancement classes, GED preparation classes and GED testing fees.

Tribal Employment Enhancement is available for Cow Creek Tribal members that live outside the 7-county service area. The Tribal Employment Enhancement assistance is intended for employment enhancement classes, GED preparation classes and GED testing fees.

Adult Vocational Training is available for Cow Creek Tribal members who live within the 7-county service area. The Adult Vocational Training assistance is intended for vocational training programs that will be complete within 2 years.

Higher Education Program is available for Cow Creek Tribal members regardless of where they live. The Higher Education Program assistance is intended for obtaining a 4 year degree from a col-

lege or university and for pursuing a Master's degree program or Doctoral degree program.

Continuing and Distance
Education Program is available for Cow Creek Tribal
members regardless of where
they live. The Continuing and
Distance Education Program
is intended for the completion
of a certificate program, 2
year degree, 4 year degree,
Master's degree or Doctoral
degree. Tribal Members are
required to take 1-7 credits

each quarter/semester and be working towards one of the defined degree programs.

Life Time Learning Program is available for Cow Creek Tribal members regardless of where they live. The Life Time Learning Program is intended for Life Time Learning classes and encompasses classes approved by the Tribal Board of Directors.
