Any registered voter of the Tribe present at the May meeting each year may nominate. Each person may nominate one individual for the election. When the nominations are closed, no other nominations will be accepted.

A nomination will be considered complete when the nominee has accepted the nomination in writing. Nomination acceptance forms will be furnished to all candidates present at the meeting. For those nominees not present, forms will be mailed to them no later than three (3) days following the nominations meeting and must be received in the tribal office no later than June 10th of each year. Candidate acceptance forms will be placed in the election file. Candidates names will be placed on the ballot in the order the nominations are made.

### GOVERNOR'S PROCLAMATION OF AMERICAN INDIAN WEEK

On Thursday, May 13th, Governor Barbara Roberts will officially proclaim American Indian Week in Oregon. The ceremony will take place in her office between 10:00 a.m. - 12:00 p.m. Tribal members are welcome to attend the ceremony. This would be especially meaningful for children.

### COW CREEK INDIAN BINGO CELEBRATES 1ST ANNIVERSARY

On April 30th, Cow Creek Indian Bingo completed the first year of operation at the gaming center in Canyonville. The video machines were in the facility in mid-February and have proven successful. The anniversary was covered on the front page of the Sunday edition of the News Review, (Roseburg), with positive comments from the community.

### KEEPING AN EYE ON GAMING ISSUES

At this time, the Board of Directors are closely monitoring Indian gaming issues on the national level, and will prepare input in Congressional action. The outcome of these decisions are critical to gaming's future.

The Grand Ronde Tribe is following the lead of the Cow Creeks in pursuing their Class III Gaming Compact. Our tribe has given assistance to three tribes, to be helpful in their compact negotiations. In their news letter, the Grand Ronde's use us as their model: "Some Grand Ronde members point to the Canyonville, Oregon facility operated by the Cow Creek Band of Umpquas as an example of the type of business Grand Ronde is planning. The Grand Ronde Tribe has no plans to construct a casino-type facility."

### TUTOR TRAINING AVAILABLE

There will be a tutor training session held at the Administrative Office, for persons interested in training to become a tutor. This session will be sponsored by Project Literacy, Umpqua Region. It will consist of lectures, videos, role playing and hands on work. All materials will be provided by Project Literacy. Participants will receive a certificate, and college credit may be earned by completing the training. He also addressed the deadly return of an ancient disease, tuberculosis. Pat Preston gave an excellent lecture, and we hope to have him return in the future for another presentation.
